Spring Break: Traveling with Your Dog

1. Get to the vet.

Before a road trip is a good time to take your pet for a checkup with your veterinarian. Beyond ensuring your pet's health, it's the only way to get a bona fide health certificate and rabies certificate that is necessary if you board your pet at your destination.

The vet may also test for heartworm and give other vaccinations, including Bordetella, parvo, and even Lyme disease, depending on where you're headed. Pets traveling to Canada, Mexico, or beyond, require more legal documentation and sometimes a quarantine period. (Check with your veterinarian).

2. Tags aren't just for luggage.

Your dog should always have a sturdy collar with home address and telephone number on a tag. Many pets today also have a microchip implanted under their skin as a form of permanent ID; it can be read with a special scanner. Also carry a current photograph of your dog that can be copied, to make it easier for others to recognize and return him if he gets lost.



3. Pack — and plan — for your pet.

Just like you, pets like the comforts of home: bring their own bedding, toys, brush, even their own dishes. Pack a bowl for his water, treats, a first-aid kit, medications (both oral and topical), and a copy of his medical records. Most important, though, bring your pet's own food to avoid stomach upsets and diarrhea.

An abrupt change in water could also give him diarrhea. Start with a gallon of water from home, and "water your dog" along the route, topping off the gallon from a local water source at each stop. That way, the change is gradual.

If you're planning on staying at a hotel with your dog, confirm the details of your reservations in advance.

And of course, don't forget the pooper scoopers.

4. Use some restraint. Just as humans need seatbelts, animals need some form of safety restraint when in the car. Pet carriers or seat belt harnesses will provide safety, Carriers are essentially boxes made to confine and secure your animal. They come in different shapes, sizes and materials, but all should be an appropriate size, well ventilated and have a secure latch. Most important is to actually secure the carrier to the car; otherwise it can become a projectile, injuring both your pet and the car's occupants.

A special restraining harness can connect a dog to safety belts, preventing him from flying forward during sudden braking or impact. The dog can stand, sit or lie down, but not get loose. When you're ready to leave the car, just snap the leash onto the dog's harness and you're ready to go.

5. Dogs love trucks, but... Dogs love trucks; it's true, but it's estimated that more than 100,000 dogs die from falls from pickup trucks each year. According to the Humane Society of the United States, there is no harness or leash that will keep a dog safe in the back of a pickup truck — in fact, it could strangle or drag him if he's thrown. Instead, place the dog in a carrier (made specially for that purpose) in the back of an extended or crew cab — and tie it down tight.

6. Animals get car sick, too.

Some people get car sick; so do some animals. Give your pet a light meal a few hours before you leave and feed and water him minimally during the drive. If your dog isn't accustomed to car travel or to a carrier, break him in gradually, well in advance of the trip, by taking short trips and using lots of praise. See your veterinarian for help if vomiting still occurs.

7. No doggy in the window.

Dogs absolutely love to stick their heads out the window and smell the air as it rushes by. However, many dogs are injured when road debris or insects fly into their eyes, nostrils or windpipe. They can also get ill by having cold air forced into their lungs. Some dogs have even strangulated themselves by stepping on the electric window control, so keep the dog inside.

What To Do With Lost or Found Animals

If you have lost your pet, please come to the shelter and see if your pet is here, and if not, file a lost report. Photos are extremely helpful and may help identify your pet. Please check back with us every 2-3 days as we cannot guarantee we will recognize your pet.

Some information on resources specific to our area: Kentuckiana Lost & Found Pet Network is а verv active Facebook Page. Post your pets photo there, and watch for your pet to be posted as found. In addition, a local Facebook page, New Albany Floyd Co Lost & Found Pets has been started. Please use this resource too, as the number of animals on Kentuckiana Lost and Found be overwhelming! Pets can Many people post Lost and Found pets on Craigslist and the local newspapers. Contact any veterinarians, groomers, or businesses in the area that your pet was lost. If your pet has a microchip, contact the company and let them know your pet is missing, and confirm that your contact information is accurate. Make sure that you have vaccination records and a photo of you and your pet accessible as proof of ownership to reclaim your pet.

If you find a lost pet, you are required to attempt to find the owner before keeping the animal or rehoming it. First, contact your local animal shelter to see if anyone has reported the pet missing. The pet should be identified by breed, color, special characteristics, and be scanned for a microchip. MANY PETS NOW HAVE MICROCHIPS! Your local shelter or veterinarian can help you with these items.

Also, check the the Facebook pages mentioned above. Post your found pets photo there, and watch for the pet to be posted as lost. Many people post Lost and Found pets on Craigslist and the local newspapers. Contact any veterinarians, groomers, or businesses in the area that the pet was found..
